<p>11:15 - 11:30</p>	<p><i>Case study #1:</i> Future Memory - Judit Horgas PhD One of the cornerstones of Future Memory is to use experiential learning methods to replace negative memories with positive, forward looking ideas. The programme is primarily aiming at the engagement of parents with highly disadvantaged backgrounds - that often also mean very bad experiences with their own schooling - to be engaged with school and learning together with their children. This is an especially important task with STEM as research clearly shows parental bias in this field based on (often bad) personal schooling experiences. The programme has been running in Hungary in disadvantaged, primarily Roma communities for over 5 years now, and in the framework of PHERECLOS it has also been introduced in Serbia and has been ongoing for the last 2 years.</p>
<p>11:30 - 11:45</p>	<p><i>Case study #2:</i> Parent'R'Us - Luca László, Parents International The main barrier in parental engagement is often the presence of a</p>

	<p>cultural divide. The Parent'R'Us framework offers mentoring to parents and most importantly to teachers by parents belonging to culturally different, often disadvantaged groups. The practice has been chosen as one of the twelve most inspiring and scalable parental engagement programmes globally by the HundrED community and it is being implemented in a growing number of countries beyond the initial ones: Hungary, Portugal, Romania and Spain.</p>
